	Air-Rifle Shooting	<i>Can you hit the target? Try your skill shooting an air powered BB gun at the target. (You must be at least 12 years old.) Rifle Shot badge was one of the originals!</i>
	Archery	<i>Do you think you can hit the target? Maybe even get a BULLSEYE? Using a bow and arrow can be challenging, but it is also fun! The first Archer proficiency badge was introduced in 1926.</i>
	Boondoggle	<i>Can you do square? Round?? How about spiral?!! Both Daisy and B-P used boondoggle "woggles" to hold their neckerchiefs.</i>
	Camp Outdoor Improv	<i>Show off your comedic talents . . . Girl Scout talent shows were sponsored as part of the National Good Turn to gather food and clothes for the needy in the 1930's.</i>
	Canoeing	<i>It's not hard to paddle a canoe, once you learn a few tricks! Swamping leaders is encouraged (not)!! What a great way to spend part of your camp day!! The Boatswain merit badge debuted in 1913.</i>
	Embossed Velvet Journals	<i>Show your creative side by embossing a design into velvet to create your very own journal. Maybe you can use it to write your remembrances of camporee . . . Both Daisy Low and B-P loved to draw!! Girl Scout journals date back to 1916 with the Scribe Merit Badge.</i>
	Fencing	<i>Think Captain Jack Sparrow when it comes to this activity. Thrust and parry . . . what is an epee, anyway? Maybe this sport is for you!!</i>
	Fishing	<i>Daisy Low loved to fish. What's in the lake?</i>
	Geo-Cache (DOUBLE SESSION)	<i>Is there hidden treasure at Camp Cutler? Learn how to work together as a team using high tech GPS units and coordinates to find out. Pathfinder Merit Badge was just the thing in 1913.</i>
	Girl Scout Survivor (DOUBLE SESSION)	<i>OutScout - Outwit - Outplay!!!! Are your Scoutcraft and cooking skills up for the challenge?? Like they had to be to earn the Pioneer badge in 1913?</i>
	Jewelry Making	<i>Something stylish for you . . . or for a gift!!! Girl Scouts have been making beautiful things to wear since the 1912.</i>
	Obstacle Course	<i>You and your patrol mates will love to try your skill at this one. Working together is the best thing about Girl Scouting!!</i>
	Orienteering	<i>Learn compass skills and find all the markers in this old-school adventure!!</i>
	Pilates	<i>Stretch and get fit for the rest of your camporee adventures. It all began with the Personal Health badge in 1913.</i>
	Rifle Shooting	<i>Learn firearm safety and have a "blast" learning how to shoot a .22 caliber, single shot, bolt action rifle. (You must be at least 12 years old.) Rifle Shot badge was one of the originals!</i>
	Silk screening (DOUBLE SESSION)	<i>Create your own design, and put it on a t-shirt or scarf.</i>
	Teamwork Challenge	<i>Can your group master land skis -- a time honored tradition of patrol coordination?</i>
